OUR NEW FEDERAL BUILDING

Completion of the new Federal Building in Hartford, Connecticut, is the fruition of a General Services Administration goal to consolidate in one location the activities of many agencies of the Federal Government.

The continuing growth of Connecticut's Capital city naturally was accompanied by a corresponding increase in the space requirements of these agencies. Expensive rentals had to be resorted to in order to carry on assigned missions. Experience proved that rented locations were impossible in a centralized locality and liaison among the agencies was awkward at its best.

Conveniently located to the downtown business area, the new 7-story Federal Building is of reinforced concrete construction with brick masonry facing and provides about 190,000 square feet of floor space for government business.

More than two years in construction at a cost of approximately \$6,700,000, the new building combines the most modern methods of design and construction. It is completely air conditioned, provides commodious courtroom facilities, an up-to-date cafeteria and parking facilities for employees and transients.

Twelve Federal agencies heretofore housed in rented space at an aggregate annual cost of about \$290,000 and comprising about 1,000 employees, will occupy the new structure.
